Golf Yang holds one-stroke lead Chapman strong

RANCHO MIRAGE, Calif. (AP) - An openinground 67 at the Kraft Nabisco Championship is just a bonus to Lindsey Wright. After fighting her way back from depression and anxiety to rejoin the LPGA Tour, she's grateful for every good day on the links and every peaceful night away from golf.

Wright began the first major of the year one stroke behind leader Amy Yang, who shot a 6-under 66 on Thursday. Wright even outplayed top-ranked Yani Tseng, whose 68 ended her streak of eight consecutive rounds with a lead.

With five birdies on the back nine of the Dinah Shore Tournament Course, Wright took another positive step in her revitalization. After quitting golf for the final four months of last the 32-year-old vear. Australian returned with a victory in the New Zealand Women's Open last month, followed by this strong start at Mission Hills.

"I'm really enjoying my golf," Wright said. "It's not a grind anymore. I'm actually enjoying it, the good and the bad.'

Wright, a Pepperdine graduate who lives in Florida, has earned more than \$2.2 million despite never winning an LPGA Tour event. She was outstanding in 2009, earning top-four finishes in two majors, but success didn't provide the happiness she


